40% FORMATIVE ASSESSMENTS

<u>Formative Assessments focus on the process</u> toward completing a product and <u>provide feedback</u> and information during the instructional process.

Examples:

- Classwork
- On-demand writing, summaries
- DBQ's and close reading questions
- Daily wrap-ups
- Student discussions
- Reading logs/responses
- Pair and group work
- Observations during in-class activities
- Reading/writing conferences
- Peer feedback and self-reflections
- Drafts of essays submitted throughout the writing process
- Project phases submitted at various completion points

25% TESTS

<u>Summative Assessments</u> are <u>product-oriented</u> and <u>assess the final product</u> and are typically given at the end of a set point during or at the end of a marking period to assess what has been learned and how well it was learned, based on learning standards-aligned rubrics.

Examples:

- Unit Assessments
- Final Drafts of essays
- NYC Social Studies Performance Assessments (MOSL)

25% PROJECTS

<u>Summative Assessments</u> are <u>product-oriented</u> and <u>assess the final product</u> and are typically given at the end of a set point during or at the end of a marking period to assess what has been learned and how well it was learned, based on learning standards-aligned rubrics.

Examples:

- Performances
- Presentations
- Culminating student discussions or debates
- End of unit projects or long-term assignments
